

Statement on ABC's Supportive Housing Ban

On February 26th, Mayor Sim and five councillors from the ABC Party voted in favour of a motion to "freeze" the most effective tool at their disposal to address homelessness: housing with integrated support for residents.

We are sad and angry at the cruelty of those who supported the motion. We are disappointed that our elected officials would use our vulnerable neighbours as human bargaining chips.

We are also determined to keep fighting.
